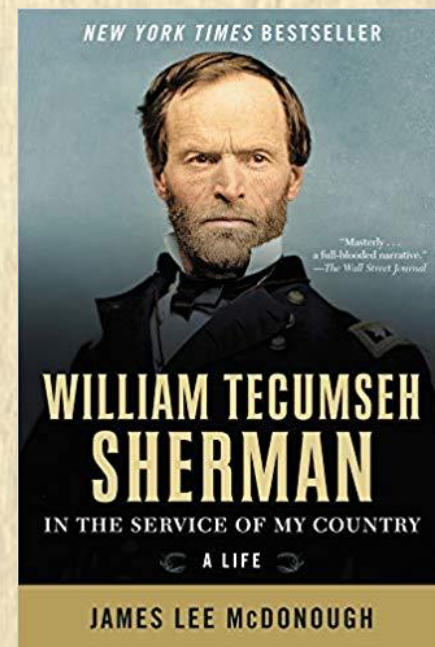

“Forty Acres and a Mule”

William T. Sherman and Reparations

In January 1865, soon after the March to the Sea, General William T. Sherman was part of

discussions that led to Field Order No. 15. The short-hand of that document is now “Forty Acres and a Mule,” a phrase attached to the most radical of Republican plans for Reconstruction: confiscating land from slaveowners for freedmen.



President Johnson rescinded the order later that year. Andrew J. Carlson tells the story of Field Order No. 15, contextualizes Sherman’s intentions, and examines what he remembered about the radical document years later.

Andrew J. Carlson is a Professor of History at Capital University.

“Ohio Politics in the Civil War”

Ohio was far from united when war broke out, reflecting the divisions in the rest of the country.



Two of the nation’s leading Copperheads, Rep. Clement Vallandigham and Rep. Edson B. Olds, came from Ohio. More than 300,000 Ohioans would serve in the Civil War while 1,000 joined the Confederacy.
